In May of that year, three of our charter members were inducted into the Society by members of the Alpha chapter in Greensboro. In a few weeks, nine more women were added to the membership from Rockingham and Caswell counties. So, this year marks the 70th anniversary of our chapter!

Over these seventy years, we have honored scores of exemplary women educators with membership and had the involvement of some of the most outstanding educational professionals in our area in a variety of projects. Our largest membership peaked at around 60 members in the early 2000s. Right now, as we come out of the pandemic years, we have 35 active and reserve members and are poised to welcome one new member next month. We would love to have several new members join us in the coming months or have some of our previous members return! Let's work on this!

Our Grant-in-Aid recipient this year is from Rockingham Early College HS - Her name is Jamiee Kelley. She will attend UNCG.


CHAPTER VOLUNTEER PROJECT UPDATE


ARE YOU A PARLIAMENTARIAN?




Book Recommendation

As an inspirational message, Co-President D. Russell read a 1914 local news article that encourage teachers to attend the Chautauqua lectures to reinvigorate themselves. Second Vice President S. Lassiter led the collect and response. Hostesses were Chair W. Smith, C. Rutledge, and W. Carter. C. Drye catered the meal. Twenty-one members attended the meeting.

C. Griffin presented a program on Help, Incorporated: Center Against Violence agencies. Much information was given on Kaleidoscope which is the Children's Advocacy Center. Services described included multidisciplinary team investigations, forensic interviews, court advocacy, mental health counseling, and medical assessments.
