FROM OUR PRESIDENT

Looking Forward to 2021

2021 will mark my 30th year as a member of Delta Kappa Gamma. I can still recall my induction into Alpha Delta chapter in 1991 at the Penn Center in Reidsville. Martha and Ruth also joined our chapter that evening. I probably rushed in and looked a bit disheveled on a Friday night, as I was the mother of three young children at the time, ages 11, 5, and 3, and, like most of my colleagues in the chapter then, had taught students all day. Everything was all new to me and, in truth, it took me several years to become familiar with the broader organization and get really comfortable with all the traditions and programs of DKG. What I most felt in 1991 was that my selection for membership was an honor, one that C. Summerlin, the principal of my children's school, Dillard Primary, had nominated me for. She was a noted leader in our community—as an educational professional and also the Regional Governor of Rotary International. So, I started in Delta Kappa Gamma, appreciative of having been

noticed by a respected educator and honored by membership in the organization. As I gradually learned more about DKG, I took on the updating and printing of our yearly chapter handbook and directory, mainly because that task of the Second Vice-President best fit my skills. I was the publications advisor at the high school where I taught and had some limited knowledge of early computer layout—it was the 1990s, after all. During this decade, I always enjoyed the camaraderie at meetings, singing our DKG song and sometimes playing the piano if needed.

As we moved into the 2000s, I began to enjoy our four meetings each year more and more. I tried to attend every meeting and didn't miss many. I especially looked forward to seeing the friends I had made with teachers across our two counties and enjoyed trading news and teaching ideas with others in the chapter who taught English and history. Once, Martha gave me a whole set of lesson plans on a novel we both taught and Marguerite and Jeryl shared ideas for teaching U.S. history. Our Alpha Delta chapter gave me a support system for those years when teaching was becoming more and more demanding and classes were filled to the brim.

In 2005, my membership in DKG provided me with a life-changing opportunity. As the recipient of a Cornetet Award, I was able to spend a whole week in Boston studying at the Massachusetts Historical Society under an acclaimed expert in the American Revolution from Harvard. From this point on, I knew that I wanted to read and learn all I could about history. I applied for and was accepted at several other summer programs in history for teachers and after my retirement from the high school after thirty years in the classroom, I set out to achieve a graduate degree and training as a historian. I earned my doctorate in 2019 and I can clearly mark the point at which I made this professional commitment—all starting with the incredible opportunity I had because of my Delta Kappa Gamma membership. In more recent years, I served as president of our chapter (learning a little more with each meeting) and began attending state conventions with Rachel, who remarkably has gone to every one since her induction in 1995. This has led to my serving on two state level committees and more understanding of the many missions of our organization. Since the pandemic has required us to meet digitally in 2020, I have had more contact than ever before with state DKG leaders. In retirement, DKG is giving me a way to stay engaged with educational issues.

Perhaps most importantly, my thirty years as a member of Delta Kappa Gamma has brought me friendships with so many wonderful women educators. Our chapter is truly close and I love and celebrate you all in 2021!

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BEGINNING TEACHER MINI GRANT WINNERS




India Trice Mini-Grant Recipient Caswell County Schools

Obituary for Past Member: Ruth Moore Page

Ruth Moore Page, 93, died peacefully at home in Yanceyville, NC with her family on Saturday, December 26, 2020.

Born on March 30, 1927 to Lloyd G. Moore and Hattie Lowe Moore in Lowgap, NC, hers was a hardscrabble life growing up after the death of her mother when Ruth was a toddler, death of her beloved older sister, Velna, when Ruth was a teenager and the deprivation of the Great Depression. Her caring teachers at Lowgap School kept her supplied with books at home which inspired a lifelong love of learning and reading. After graduating from Appalachian State University in 1950 (then Appalachian State Teachers College) majoring in English and Business Education, she taught English in Ronda and Ruffin, NC and later business subjects at Bartlett Yancey High School in Yanceyville where she taught 26 years until her retirement in June 1990. When computer use became an integral part of everyone's life, she took pride in knowing she had taught so many to type! While teaching, she also taught a Sunday School class for many years, was active in the Delta Kappa Gamma teachers' sorority, the Ladies Auxiliary of the VFW, made many of her and her daughter's clothes, even sewing dance costumes for her daughter and others when performing in the Ann Boyer dance recitals. Her summers were spent preserving vegetables from the gardens her husband grew and she always prepared delicious home cooked meals. During her retirement years she enjoyed maintaining a beautiful lawn, playing Scrabble and card games with family and Bridge with friends, producing the newsletter for her church, Prospect United Methodist, voracious reading and most of all, her grandchildren whom she adored. Most recently she enjoyed sitting on her porch admiring any blooming thing in sight, the company of visitors and her caregivers Terry Meares and Claudette Stephens who made every effort to engage with, humor and affirm her. And she loved her kitty, Jenny. Survivors are her daughter, Rebecca Page, and son in law Robert Foyle, of the home in Yanceyville, grandchildren, Helen (Len) Page Foyle, currently of the home due to the pandemic and Edward Page Foyle of Seattle, Washington, brothers Keith Moore of Macclenny, FL and Seafus "Ted" Moore of Whittemore, MI along with numerous nieces and nephews, great and great great too. In addition to her parents and sister, she was predeceased by her husband of 59 years, Wilbur J. Page, and brothers, Everett Moore, and Earl Moore. The family especially thanks Victoria Smith, Carolyn Meeks, Terri Foster, Terry Meares, Claudette Stephens, caregivers who made it possible for Ruth to remain at home, along with Hospice of Alamance-Caswell (now Authoracare) nurse, Sarah, and CNA, Doretha. Also, special thanks to Betsy Watlington, a dear friend, who visited regularly before the pandemic. Due to Covid-19, the family welcomes visitors where we can sit on the porch or visit in the yard.
