President Massengale thanked Russell for serving two terms as chapter president and gifted her with a bracelet featuring the DKG rose.

Membership Committee members Debbie Russell and Paige McCargo led a Remembrance ceremony in memory of Mary Hux (August 30, 2016). Mary's many contributions were highlighted along with the sharing of fond memories.

Following dinner the Educational Excellence Committee chaired by Wanda Smith was in charge of the program. Speaker Dee Martin of the Rockingham County Literacy Project shared the history and current agenda for the agency. A Vera Bradley wallet was raffled which allowed the chapter to donate \$77.00 to the Literacy Project. Donna Rawlins won the raffle. Following the program Wanda Smith lead the chapter members in a get acquainted activity.

The business meeting was called to order by President Massengale. The minutes were approved. The treasurer's report stated a balance of \$7335.25 and the Grant-In-Aid \$3060.05. "Look beneath the surface," warns the Ed Law & Policy Committee

Even though voting is now over, this article is very informative and explains the answers to some of our lingering questions. ~ editor

There are quite a few claims being made in political ads lately that should be viewed with a skeptical eye. Consider these things when you vote this fall.

- **#1.** "NC is giving its teachers the greatest salary increase of any state in the nation." This is only true because the "average" increase of 4.7% (which is more than many on the salary schedule will be getting this year) comes on the heels of a 0% increase last year. Other states have increased salaries steadily and therefore do not have to initiate larger increases. Think about what salary increases there have been in the last four years, not just during this election year.
- **#2.** "NC is spending more money on education than ever before." Dollar-wise this is true, but remember: NC is one of the fastest-growing states in the nation. Between 2010 and 2020, NC's school population is projected to increase 11%. Even though we are spending more dollars than ever, our per-pupil expenditure rate is falling, leaving us at the bottom of all southeastern states and in the bottom five nationwide. Currently, NC is spending 40 to 50% less for instructional technology and instructional materials than it did before the 2008 recession. There are also far fewer teaching assistants than pre-recession numbers as well.
- #3. Long-time teachers in NC's classrooms are shocked to hear that "The average teacher in NC now earns \$50,000 a year." To come up with this figure, the proponents of this claim assume that all 2015-2016 teachers will stay in their positions, and none will retire and be replaced by a younger teacher earning significantly less. They also include in their calculations the Wake County local salary supplement (not financed by the state), one of the three most generous local supplements in the state, as part of the compensation package.

Certainly most teachers are not so fortunate to receive such a large local supplement, and some receive no supplement at all. In addition, it is seldom mentioned that two years ago legislators took teachers' Longevity Pay, which rewards employees for staying with the state, and folded it into the teacher salary schedule and called it a raise. Now all other school employees

and state employees receive this reward, but teachers do not.

Let us put things in perspective. Average teachers in NC do not really earn \$50K, but even if they did, that still puts them 41st in the nation, about \$10,000 less than what the nation's average teacher is paid. Also, many other professions requiring a four-year college degree and specific professional licensure often start at higher levels of pay and can expect to


