This project will assist 1,000 schools in eleven African countries to build/renovate, create new schools, provide clean water, and school supplies, train 100,000 teachers, and teach hygiene and disease prevention



Alpha Delta Members...Making a Difference Carol Holcomb

In the fall of 2012, thirty-two Alpha Delta members completed a volunteer information survey. For the purpose of this survey, volunteer was described as any activity in which one participates and is not compensated. The Leadership Development committee compiled the results.

The survey reveals the majority of members spend their time and talents involved in some type of church activity. While many members are involved in musical activities and teaching groups, three-fourths of the respondents participate in small group activities and serve in leadership or committee member positions.

Surprisingly, the smallest amount of volunteer activity falls in the school/education category. The level of involvement in this area is concentrated in the following activities: tutor/reading buddy/mentor, Back Pack Program, lunch bud-

dy/lunch guest, fundraising volunteer, book fair assistant, and carnival/festivals/ Harvest Days.

Members are involved in an array of community activities. Ten of the members who completed the survey are members of the Retired School Personnel. Nearly as many volunteer in some capacity for the Salvation Army. While numerous organizations receive the benefit of involvement from Alpha Delta members, the other leading community organizations include: Friends of the Library, Theatre Guild, MARC, Dental Clinic, YMCA, and Meals on Wheels.

Some of the unique ways members volunteer their time and talents include serving as a church lay speaker, judging senior projects, participating in various local food efforts, judging for History Day at the NC History Museum, coordinating the Caswell Parish activities, and preparing taxes at a senior center.

When we asked to indicate ways in which one volunteers other than giving time, over half responded the bake/ prepare food for others such as shut-ins, bake sales. Fourteen indicated they ring the bell. Other high levels of participation include working festival/ booths, sponsor and/or participate in charitable golf tournaments/walks, and donate blood or work at bloodmobiles. Some member indicated they donate money to favorite charities/ organizations.

Clearly, this survey is not an example of scientific research nor does it include all of the possibilities of volunteer participation. However, one can certainly conclude Alpha Delta members are busy and active and make a difference in their communities.



Society Headquarters Selected as a Historic Place

Have you ever wondered how buildings or locations become part of the National Register of Historic Places? It is a process that involves research and time. First, is an important questionis the property old enough and still looks close to the original? If the property is 50 years old or more and maintains the integrity of its era, the next step in the process becomes available. Then a property is nominated, reviewed, goes through an evaluation and after meeting rigorous standards may be granted the distinction.

Society Headquarters in Austin, Texas, opened in the downtown area in 1956. The interior has been decorated since the original pink and blue color scheme but remains much the same in furnishings. In 2012, the building was recognized as a property of the National Register of Historic Places. Dr. Beverly Helms, international president and Corlea Plowman, executive director, will work with Phyllis Hickey, operation services administrator, Nita Scott, membership services administrator and Dr. Linda Eller, information services administrator, to establish the ideal location for the distinguished plaque. When the plaque displaying the honor is installed, all members and employees can celebrate.

An Author in Our Group: Katherine Pasour

We are so proud of Katherine, better known as Winky, and the publication of her first novel, "Sheltered by An Angel's Wings." She shares the following to give us some background on how her book came to be.

Shortly after 9/11, I had a dream which seemed to stick in my head. (I usually do not remember my dreams after awakening. I finally jotted down the main points and laid the note beside my beside table. It kept beckoning and calling, "do something with me!" So, in 2003, I began writing. Part 1 of Sheltered by an Angel's Wings is based on that dream. After several years of work, I put it aside again (things got really busy at Lenoir-Rhyne, but the book began calling to me again and in 2012, finally finished it. I pondered my reasons for writing--what did I want to do with this now that it was, at last, finished? I believe God has blessed me with a gift to write a good story (usually that has been limited to Christmas plays at Bethlehem Methodist Church), but this time God was calling me to be a witness for Christ with my writing, so I sought out a Christian publishing company (CrossBooks) and now my story is a "read" book that I pray will be an inspiration for others.


Winky will be bringing some copies to the March meeting.
