Our members have been encouraged to collect Box Tops for Education over the past year.



She was honored at the opening session of the Eta State Convention in Winston-Salem and presented a Golden Key pin. Chapter President, Debbie Russell, said of Scott, "She is so deserving of the award. Rachel is truly the backbone of our chapter!"

Scott has served as chapter president and assistant treasurer of Alpha Delta and has chaired numerous committees. At the state and regional level, she has chaired the Headquarters Committee and attended two Southeast Regional conferences. "Carol Holcomb, herself a Golden Key winner, did a wonderful job of conveying Rachel's contributions on the nomination form," Russell said. "Rachel has many DKG friends across the state who were very pleased that she was recognized with this award."

According to the *Eta* State website, Rachel truly embodies what the Golden Key was meant to recognize:

Heads Up from the Education Law & Policy Committee

Please alert your members that the General Assembly in Raleigh is contemplating major changes to the NC Teachers and State Employees' Retirement Plan. Under consideration is the discontinuation of the Defined-Benefits Retirement System and the introduction of a Defined-Contribution System. The difference is stark and has implications for North Carolina's ability to attract high quality educators and other workers to our state in the future.

The current Defined-Benefits System has state employees contributing 6% of their salaries and the state contributing the other 9.15% for retirement. These funds are invested and monitored by the state treasurer and results in a guaranteed pension based on a a standard formula of service time and money invested. The Defined-Contribution System, on the other hand, has no guaranteed benefits and all the risks and benefits of any investment are shouldered by the employee instead of the state. Retirement benefits will fluctuate with market ebbs and lows. (During the stock market crash of 2008 this retirement system would have been very debilitating for retirees.) Money invested by an employee would also be subject to management fees.

Please do all you can do to head this idea off before it can get any traction. Contact your Senator and Representative to urge their support for a Defined-Benefits Retirement System. To find your representatives' contact information, go to www.nleg.net and click on "Who represents me?" at the top right side of the homepage. Find your District numbers for House and Senate on the map, put in the numbers and see your representatives' contact information. Committee meetings happen before the 2016 session begins on April 25, so NOW is the time to act!


