Share a tweet or two on Twitter

Twitter is a micro-blogging tool usable on smartphones, iPads or tablets, laptops and desktop computers. To create an account go to Twitter.com, set up an account via the sign up link, follow each of the steps provided, establish your chosen username and password. Follow other people, companies and things of interest to you. Twitter users post a tweet that can be only 140 characters, including spaces and punctuation. It is designed for quick, short, informative bits of information to be shared with

all others on Twitter.

If using Twitter on smartphone, you can stay up to date on news as it happens, be aware of what your friends are doing, and share interesting happenings you experience. From the Twitter ABOUT page, "Twitter is a real-time information network." CNN has twitter feed along with most other broadcasting companies. But the impact of Twitter comes from people who share what they see happening in the world today. Using Twitter is the fastest method for staying informed. Perhaps we should try it.

What is the Golden Key Award?

This award is designed for those members who are often times in the background getting things done with personal glory or gain for themselves. The Eta State Golden Key Award honors Delta Kappa Gamma members who have made significant contributions to Delta Kappa Gamma at various levels of the Society. One member from each of the elven (11) regions will be honored at the Eta State Convention. Recipients must be active members of Delta Kappa Gamma in Eta State for at least seven (7) years. No current elected state officer, appointed personnel, past Eta State

president, or current member of the awards committee are eligible. Recipients must uphold the principles and purposes of Delta Kappa Gamma by being involved in local and state initiatives.

No member may receive this award more than once. Members nominated in previous years, but not selected may have their names resubmitted. Names of nominees shall remain anonymous. Each chapter can nominate one member annually.

Special emphasis is directed toward Delta Kappa Gamma participation,

community involvement, involvement in other organizations and involvement in education in general are important in the selection process.


Summer Book Club Selection: <u>Unbroken</u> by Lauren Hillenbrand

"On a May afternoon in 1943, an Army Air Forces bomber crashed into the Pacific Ocean and disappeared leaving only a spray of debris and a slick of oil, gasoline, and blood. Then, on the ocean surface, a face appeared. It was that of young lieutenant, the plane's bombardier, who was struggling to a life raft and pulling himself aboard. So began one of the most extraordinary odysseys of the Second World War.

The lieutenant's name was Louis Zamperini. In boyhood, he'd been a cunning and incorrigible delinquent, breaking into houses, brawling, and fleeing his home to ride the rails. As a teenager, he had channeled his defiance into running, discovering a pro-

digious talent that had carried him to the Berlin Olympics and within sight of the four-minute mile. But when war had come, the athlete had become n airman, embarking on a journey that led to his doomed flight, a tiny raft, and a drift into the unknown.

Ahead of Zamperini lay thousands of miles of open ocean, leaping sharks, a foundering raft, thirst and starvation, enemy aircraft, and, beyond, a trial



even greater. Driven to the limits of endurance, Zamperini would answer desperation with ingenuity; suffering with hope, resolve, and humor; brutality with rebellion. His fate whether triumph or tragedy, would be suspended on the fraying wire of his will.

Rules, Rules, Rules

If you were at the last meeting, you already know that we will vote at our May meeting to accept or reject the proposed revisions to our chapter rules. Most of the changes are the result of aligning our rules with those of Eta State and International, which is required. For example, we will no longer have a limit on the number of years a proposed member may be retired. Previously, we could invite a retiree into membership only if she had been retired no more than three years. Further, if a former member wishes to be reinstated as a member, she may without a chapter vote.

The rules committee did a "local" change to our existing rules. To assist with the collection of dues, the committee added "An email dues notification may be sent by the treasurer in early September as a reminder." Our rules state dues are to be paid to the treasurer on or before the October meeting.

The biggest changes to Alpha Delta's chapter rules concern the reorganization of our committees. In order to be consistent with Eta State, the rules committee has proposed to organize our chapter into two main designations, Society Business and Society Mission and Purposes. Some committee names have changed, but the responsibilities and purposes of the committees have not. We may also add or keep committees we feel are important to our chapter.

In years past, we established a quorum of twenty members present in order to conduct business, and a majority vote is sufficient for most of our business. Also, on some matters which are deemed extremely important, we determined that we needed, for example, two thirds of the ballots cast.

As we begin a biennium July 1, these revised documents will be extremely helpful to those planning for our chap-

ter. Before our March meeting, members received by e-mail two documents regarding the changes: 2012 Changes to Alpha Delta Chapter Rules and the proposed Chapter Rules. Please review these documents and be ready to vote so that our leaders can proceed with their plans.
