Annual Book Club Meeting

Leadership Development Committee

Eleven Alpha Delta members met at Madison's Blue Naples restaurant on July 23rd for an experience that encompassed much excellence: outstanding food, intense book analysis and most importantly, much sisterhood bonding.

The committee chose Sue Monk Kidd's work, THE INVENTION OF WINGS, for our summer event, the same novel selected for the annual ROCKING-HAM READS experiences. Due to snow, the County events were cancelled.

The book, which is based on factual events, describes struggles women endured prior to the Civil War concerning liberation and empowerment. As the main characters, Charlestonian slave Hetty "Handful" Grimke and her owner Sarah Grimke, form a lasting bond of friendship, the novel focuses on the prejudices both face as each seeks freedom from an oppressive society.

Committee member Carolyn Lester facilitated the discussion. As the group explored the novel's themes. Carolyn encouraged attendees to relate personal experiences they have witnessed or experienced in their own lives. With the history teachers' assistance, the group related heartfelt memories of national and personal events prior to and including the Civil Rights' movement along with those with immigrant relatives revealing what their loved ones had endured.

Attendees contributed donations for Eden's Morehead Memorial Hospital's nursing facility in remembrance of our beloved sister, Brenda Atkins, who was in residence there prior to her passing.

Guests included Region VII Director Dr. Barbara Leonard and the Grant in Aid recipient Megan Abernathy and her sister.

Following dinner, the Educational Law and Policy Committee chaired by Nell Rose and Wanda Smith was in charge of the program. The program was given by Karyn Collie Dickerson, 2013 NC Teacher of the Year.

Presentations followed with President Debbie Russell recognizing chapter members who were Teacher of the Year during their career. Patsy Snyder presented the scholarship check to Grant in Aid recipient Megan Abernathy. The chapter also gifted Megan with a dorm shower.
